When we stepped onto the Centro Misionero Bet El campus, the service was already underway. We quietly made our way to the kitchen and children's areas. The setting was unfamiliar, but the tasks felt familiar—I grabbed a cutting board, found cleaning supplies, and began prepping alongside our team. This, I knew how to do.

As I focused on cutting chicken, two curious faces peeked out from my side.

“What are you doing?” a young voice asked.

“Cutting chicken.”

“That’s *pollo*,” he said proudly.

He pointed in Kim Hong’s direction, “*Papas*—potatoes,” he explained.

Then, holding up an onion, Robert asked, “And what’s this?”

“*Cebolla!*” the boy beamed.

He pointed at the carrots. “*Zanahorias.*”

I tried repeating the word, but stumbled.

“No, no, no... like this: *za-na-or-ee-as!*” he laughed.

I tried again, but my mouth struggled to mimic the sounds. I was hitting the limits of my pronunciation.





Suddenly, shouts and cheers erupted from the children's room. The young boys turned and rushed toward the chorus of laughter— a raucous game of musical chairs had just begun.

Janet told me about the early days of this church, how it was literally built from the ground up. What started as one building has now become three. Seeing the physical manifestation of this explosive growth was invigorating, a testament to the power of the gospel. Becca and a few others shared stories of past worship services when they got to share the stage and lead in song and praise. When I look back on the small brick of memories I have, I am but a small part of a larger story. There is a much bigger bond that binds these two churches, GBC and CM Bet El together, many other bricks of experiences already laid long before I got here.

It felt like being reunited with long-lost relatives, even though we'd never met before. We share something deeper—faith. Christ brings us together, even if we seem different at first.
